

The Practitioners' Network for Development Cooperation Organisations (hereinafter referred to as the "Practitioners' Network" or PN) is an open platform for exchange, coordination and harmonisation between European development cooperation organisations with a public service mission.

The PN was founded on 23 February 2007 as an informal European network for development cooperation organisations with a public mission. It is an informal, non-profit platform whose purpose is to harmonise and make European development cooperation more efficient through exchange and coordination. It also provides a common communication channel to the European Commission for its Members. The network is composed of 22 organisations – 17 have the status of Members, 4 have the status of Associates and 1 has the status of an Observer (the European Commission), as indicated in the list of Members below.ⁱⁱ

Tasks and Purpose

The goal of the Practitioners' Network is to contribute to coherence within the EU donor community and, at the same time, benefit from the wide range of organisations active in this field to encourage an integrated, pluralistic and innovative approach to European development cooperation, implemented as efficiently as possible. The Practitioners' Network aims to strengthen cooperation, links and complementarity between European development actors with a public service mission, creating opportunities for cooperation and synergies at the implementation level. It enables the exchange of information and experience between practitioners and provides feedback on European development policies from a practitioner's perspective, while enhancing the visibility of its Members.ⁱⁱⁱ

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Structure

General Assembly

The <u>General Assembly</u> is the main body of the PN. It meets at least once a year and is composed of all Members' representatives. The General Assembly is entrusted with strategy and budget decisions. Iv PN

Steering Committee

The <u>Steering Committee</u> prepares and implements the decisions of the General Assembly. It is composed of a troika of the past, future and current Presidencies of the PN and three other volunteer members.^v

Working Groups

The Working Groups (WGs) meet regularly and give Members of the network the opportunity to exchange positions and opinions. In doing so, they focus on topic areas prioritised within the Network. The current working groups include: a Working Group on Effective Partnerships and Implementation, a Thematic Working Group, a Working Group on Contractual and Financial Frameworks (CFF WG), and a Team Europe Task Force.

Under the Working Group on Effective Partnerships and Implementation, the following key topics have been defined: inclusive partnerships, Joint Implementation, monitoring, evaluation and results, communication and visibility, public sector expertise (PSE), gender mainstreaming, climate mainstreaming, and cooperation with international financial institutions and public development banks.

Under the Thematic Working Group, several key areas have been defined as a priority: migration and human mobility, education in emergencies, the humanitarian-development nexus, <u>Green Deal</u>, digitalisation, culture for development, and cooperation with the private sector.

The CFF WG aims to ensure that simplified and viable contractual frameworks are established under which Members can efficiently collaborate with the EU.

Launched in the midst of the global pandemic, the Team Europe Task Force was set up to facilitate the contribution of Member State Organisations (MSOs) to the <u>Team Europe</u> approach.^{vi}



Presidency and Coordination

The <u>Presidency</u> represents the Network externally to the European Commission and other stakeholders. It rotates among volunteering Members on an annual basis. It is supported by the Coordination of the Network, which carries out strategic, operational, administrative and financial tasks. Together with the PN Coordinators, the Presidency ensures the strategic planning, coherence and coordination of all activities, including general communication planning, coordination of the Steering Committee and General Assembly meetings and monitoring and evaluation of the activities of the network.^{vii}

Members

The PN is only financed by annual membership fees. The amount of the fee depends on the size of the organisation and membership status. There are different roles in which institutions and organisations can join the PN. These include the roles of full Members, Observers and Associates. Members can participate in PN activities and take on responsibilities and mandates within the network. They hold voting rights in the General Assembly. Associates can actively contribute to the thematic activities of the PN and participate in PN events. They have no voting rights in the General Assembly. The Observer status is open to intergovernmental institutions. Observers can participate in Network activities and Steering Committee meetings, but have no voting rights.

Goals and working methods

In order to work on prioritised topics, the Members meet in Working Groups which deal with operational and strategic priorities of the network. The work of the PN is regulated through its charter.^{ix} The network recognises various international agreements in the field of development cooperation as a reference framework for its work.^x These include, among others:

- the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals
- the <u>Monterrey Consensus</u> of the International Conference on Financing for Development and the <u>Addis Ababa Agenda</u> for Action on Financing for Development
- the Paris Declaration on Aid Effectiveness and the Busan Global Partnership on Aid Effectiveness
- The European Consensus on Development and subsequent EU policy documents
- The Global Strategy for the European Union's Foreign and Security Policy
